These residences serve as the centers for official state functions, and the exhibited artwork are part of the Ambassador's mission at Post.

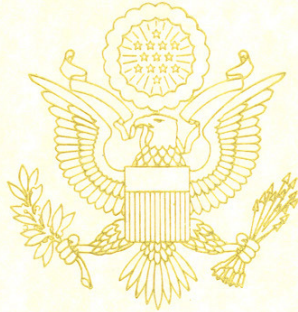
AIEP has achieved its success through lending agreements with museums, institutions, corporations, galleries, individual artists, and collectors. All works of art are selected by AIEP curators who work closely with Ambassadors and their spouses to encourage a collection reflecting their interests and vision.
